This week we are elevating the experiences of current Co-Presidents of Northwood's BSU, Javonie Ellington and Camara MacKey.



What has the BSU work experience been like for you? (continued from p. 1)

Javonie Ellington shares that with the help of the Black Alumni Association, Northwood University's Black Student Union was revitalized in 2017. The BSU provided the space for Black students to feel safe and take a break from the obliviousness around them. BSU meetings are a great experience providing a much needed "pick-me-up" throughout the week. It has made the college experience easier to bear.



With Northwood being predominantly white, within a city that is also predominantly white, the existence of BSU softened the blow of culture shock that occurred when Camara MacKey first entered Northwood's campus from Chicago. BSU allowed Camara to connect with a larger portion of the African American community at Northwood that was thought to be nonexistent.

Javonie shares that the start of his work in BSU was a hefty task. Javonie and the previous co-president worked tirelessly to build BSU to what it is today. Many hats were worn by the duo in forms of starting programs, fundraising, coordinating meetings, etc. "We were very willing to do all of this work because it is important to us and the Black students that participate. This groundwork allowed Camara to step into a very enjoyable experience when she was elected Co-President. Camara shares, "It has been enjoyable so far, putting last minute projects together because there is a support structure put in place."

This work has been met with challenges. "There has been a lot of push back from the Northwood community," Javonie Ellington, BSU Co-president. The Co-president has had to combat a lot of misconceptions about the purpose of a Black Student Union. BSU has since created partnerships with other University groups, such as, Sexual Advocacy for Everyone and the International Club. Javonie and Camara wanted to take this direction to model what it means to be inclusive. "It does not matter that Black is in the name. everyone is welcome," Javonie Ellington, BSU Co-president.

What is your Vision for the organization moving forward?

Camera MacKey's goal for the organization is to change the perception of BSU. "My main goal for the organization is to prevent it from being looked down upon for having "Black" in the name. I want to work to let people know how inclusive it actually is," Camara MacKey, BSU Co-president. Camara wants to eliminate the fear surrounding BSU events and turn that fear into positivity.

Javonie wants Black students to feel like they can be their true selves and still be successful in this space. "You don't have to change yourself, take it one day at a time to strip away all the stereotypes, bigotry, and assumptions surrounding Black people," Javonie

Ellington, BSU Co-president. Javonie wants people to get used to seeing well put together Black organizations. Northwood's BSU is a safe space to have tough conversations, to build a bond. As leaders in this work, Javonie and Camara have taken it upon themselves to model these expectations within their organization.

The month of February has given MHS Chemics time to reflect on "what we love/are

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

The Midland High School Student Council recognized the One Billion Rising Movement (OBR) with their annual campaign to bring awareness to violence against women. OBR is the largest global movement to end violence against women, with organizations that participate in almost every country of the world. The name One

Billion Rising is derived from the statistic that 1 in 3 women will be the victims of violence or rape in their lifetime. This number equates to more than one million people on our planet. This year's emphasis of the MHS campaign was to advocate for survivors of violence, provide resources to



those in need and encourage healthy relationships. The activities over the course of the week included silent statistics, where students stood silently in the hallways with posters sharing healthy relationship tips, red flags in relationships, and statistics about domestic violence including numbers citing both men & women as the victims of violence. Students participated in a Kahoot game challenge that required students to recognize the warning signs of unhealthy relationships. We ended the week by showing our support for the survivors by wearing the colors of the movements that include pink, orange, and red.

This week, the Midland High School Student Council is sponsoring a grief awareness week. This week has been created with the help and guidance of the Children's Grief Center of the Great Lakes Bay Region. The goal of this week is to create an environment where grief and grieving is recognized/normalized and to recognize that

every person experiences grief differently. The week will conclude with a luminary walk on

Saturday, March 6. The public is invited to join MHS Student Council at Stratford Woods Park, located at 3922 East Ashman Street, on Saturday, March 6, from 7-9 pm for an outdoor, socially-distanced "Walk to Remember." Volunteers will be on hand to assist with parking and to direct participants along the luminary trail. To ensure safety for all participants, our volunteers will expect masks to be worn during the walk, and they will also assist in spacing groups along the trail to avoid crowding. Scott MacNellis, owner of Lind Longes joined MHS Economics class in a Google Meet last week. Students are studying different types of business organizations and Mr. MacNellis answered many questions about the challenges and benefits of being a private business owner in Midland. He spoke of his prior history as an Art Teacher and how he and his wife Emily bought the family business from his father-in-law. Students had an opportunity to ask a variety of questions



ranging from business acquisition, struggles during a pandemic, supply costs and employee relations. MacNellis shared the many changes that his business enacted to be proactive in providing a clean, safe and healthy workplace for their employees/customers. "Great customer service and a positive customer experience is key" said MacNellis. "If you can't beat them in price, beat them in service." One student commented, "I like how you try to be creative and give your employees a chance to pitch their favorite event and hat." Another student noted, "I learned how businesses have to adapt to the changes of Covid and that you were able to be creative and innovating in locating products your customers want/need (like toilet paper)." MacNellis couldn't locate toilet paper via the regular supply route so he contacted local hotels here in Midland that were shut down and asked to purchase their toilet paper reserves, which is how LaLondes put toilet paper on their shelves for their customers. As one student summarized, "I will also remember your passion for your employees and how they are your favorite part of your job. I hope to work for an employer like you someday."
