High School students from around the State participated in the first Flint Regional Science and Engineering Fair, which was held online. Congratulations to four MPS high school students who received very impressive awards during the event.

The following was recently posted on MPS community partner—MSU St. Andrews' Facebook page: "Congratulations to all participants in the Flint Regional Science & Technology Fair. Winners were announced last night and four of our students from the 2019 summer research program received awards: The team of Grace Bremmer, Therese Joffre and Logan McNamara won one special award and 5th place in grand awards for their work on Fabrications of Scaffolds For Bone Repair and Regeneration.

David Wang received a 6th place grand award for his Quantum Computing project.

We are so proud of our young scientists!"

The special team award received by **Grace**, **Therese and Logan** for their project, Fabrications of Scaffolds for Bone Repair and Regeneration, was the McClaren Health Award for Excellence in Cellular and Molecular Biology. Congratulations Grace, Therese, Logan and David! We are proud of you!



In early November, **Jefferson Middle School** students conducted Trial 1 research according to NASA guidelines on growing 3 different species of leafy plants for consideration to grow on the **International Space Station (ISS)**. Then in early February, students designed their own test to compare with Trial 1. The students chose water conservation when growing the second set of plants, as water is limited in space travel and on the ISS. The project was to continue up until spring break, so students gathered the supplies and continued to monitor and collect data about the plants while the schools were closed. Data collected was plant height, plant width, number of leaves, health and water given. At the end, plants were harvested and biomass was measured to compare with Trial 1.

About 15 students were involved in Trial 1 and 2 research processes. Late April, NASA and Fairchild Tropical Botanic Garden in Florida sent


an email offering participants an opportunity to virtually present their poster to NASA scientists. Four Jefferson Huskies, Margaret Hitt, T'Emi Oshin,



Jessica Chai, and Sahiba Kaur, took the responsibility of preparing a presentation to share the poster and information. After 48 hours and one rehearsal with Jefferson Teacher Mrs. Christine Brillhart and Mentor Mrs. Tsay, students Zoomed with 12 NASA Scientists from all areas. Jefferson was one of 19 middle and high schools across the United States and Puerto Rico to present online. No places were

awarded this year due to the cancelled Student Research Symposium. Yet, JMS still earned recognition for the school—

Special Merit for Professional Presentation.

High School Summer eLearning Opportunity

Once school has ended for the school year, Midland Public Schools will once again be offering the Summer eLearning Program. Through this program, online courses are available to high school students who wish to earn either initial credit or credit recovery in select courses. Registration



information is now available. Our online program provides students the opportunity to recover lost credits or explore new learning through online courses which students can work on 24/7! The program will heed all safety recommendations set forth by the state. While these courses do not require students to attend classes daily, student support will be provided by email, phone call or video chat. On-site support will become available based on State of Michigan recommendations but will not be required for daily work, quizzes or tests, however, exams must be monitored. Exams will be proctored onsite (when appropriate) or virtually by appointment. Students should expect to invest 45-60 hours to complete each course, but may work on their course any place that they have an internet connection. Courses will begin on June 15, 2020 and must be completed by August 13, 2020. Students may only register for one course at a time.

The cost for each course is \$150 for Midland Public Schools' students and \$175 for students outside of the MPS district. A recent study shows that the more a teen is inactive, the more likely they are to experience symptoms of depression. Exercise has many benefits, including your brain producing more endorphins, focusing on the activity helps to forget about other worries, and improves sleep. Staying active is one of the most effective ways to stay mentally healthy and to cope with worry, sadness, and isolation. Here are some tips on starting a new routine - set goals, virtually work with a friend and encourage each other, try different activities.

How do I begin to incorporate more activity into my day?

It is good to start by recognizing that your resources and energy may be depleted.

The more inactive and slowed down we are,
the worse and more hopeless we feel - it's a cycle.

- Don't wait to feel motivated! Sometimes it may feel like we need to wait until we feel
 better before we get more active, but actually our motivation often follows action! Our
 brain can follow our body. We have to do things before we feel ready. So even though
 you may not feel like doing it, trust that once you get going, the energy will find you
 and you will feel better!
- Plan for the activity. Think realistic: What time and where will you be able to do your activity? Even if it is 15 minutes of movement, it will be beneficial!
- **Get creative.** There are many free home exercise programs and virtual yoga and dance classes available. But you could also be active by going for a walk, playing charades, playing an instrument, doing yard work, cleaning your room, offering to do family chores, drawing or painting, cooking dinner, baking, making a collage or DIY project, or playing with your pet outside. What other ideas of being active can you think of?
- **Be consistent.** Remember, we may not enjoy these activities right away, but they can still help us feel better in the long run if we stick with them. What we do every day is more important than what we do on any one day. Stick to your plan 5 to 10 times and you will see that it starts to feel more like a habit!

Each team worked collaboratively building off of each other's ideas, contributing to the final model. Finally, at Woodcrest, the teams all enjoyed learning about engineering and building sustainable cities while improving their team building skills. Students from The Charge, Dow High's Robotics team, were excited for the opportunity to assist as mentors on several teams and prepare activities for the Expos. 


